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
Introduction

Is there a communication gap around delirium when transferring patients from Critical Care to the ward?

Method

- Single ICU 12-beds & HDU 16 beds
- Ireland
- 1 month study
- n=68 patient notes reviewed





(A) 46 year old, no delirium (B) 42 year old, 12 days of delirium
