


The ICU Gloves off campaign



Gloves on



Anticipated exposure to blood, bodily fluids and mucous membranes

Touching or emptying urinary catheter

Drawing arterial bloods

Cleaning a person who has been incontinent

Vaginal or rectal examination

Contact with non-intact skin, mucous membranes and mouthcare

Contact with chemical hazards and disinfectant
 Cleaning bed spaces and spillages

Gloves off




- Routine bed making and turning patients
- Using the computer/ IPAD
- Providing closed suction via ET tube/trache
- Assessing patients if not in contact with mucous membranes/bodily fluids
- When a single aspect of patient care/treatment that requires gloves has ended

NB Remember! Perform hand hygiene before and after each interaction with patients

Purpose

- To improve hand hygiene
- To reduce waste and have a positive impact on the environment
- Help reduce the risk of hospital acquired infections

What is the Gloves off Campaign?

A team from Great Ormond Street developed the 'Gloves are off' campaign, which aims to improve patient safety by ensuring that patients and their families are seen by staff with clean hands. The aims of the project were to:

- reduce hospital acquired infections and central venous line (CVL) infection rate
- improve hand hygiene compliance
- reduce the level of dermatitis in staff due to the overuse of gloves
- improve environmental impact.

The NHS is increasingly concerned about appropriate use of single use non-sterile gloves. Following successful campaigns in other hospitals, as a unit we decided to get involved with this, aiming to reduce our glove use within critical care. Since the ICU campaign, Mid Yorkshire have begun to implement the Gloves Off throughout the rest of the Trust

- Audit tool for 5 moments of hand hygiene carried out
- Pre- questionnaire sent out to staff
- Data protection impact assessment carried out with information governance

Implications to future practice

Following observations and conversations, ICU staff are more aware of overuse

of non- sterile gloves. Staff are more regularly carrying out their own risk

assessment as to whether it is necessary to use gloves, leading to an

overall reduction in glove use and contributing to sustainability.

Moving forward it would be recommended to do a short presentation to new


Staff during induction about the gloves off campaign to raise awareness.
